a flat piece of rubber, etc. placed between two metal surfaces in a pipe or an engine to prevent steam, gas or oil from escaping

- The engine had **blown a gasket** (= had allowed steam, etc. to escape) .
- (*figurative, informal*) He **blew a gasket** at the news (= became very angry) .

Word Origin:early 17th cent.: perhaps from French *garcette* 'thin rope' (originally 'little girl'), diminutive of *garce*, feminine of *gars* 'boy' .**gasket**
