Word Origin:[**salutary**] late Middle English (as a noun in the sense 'remedy'): from French **salutaire** or Latin **salutaris**, from **salus**, **salut-** 'health'.Example Bank:

- The cost of the war should be a salutary warning to other governments.
- The experience was certainly salutary, but I wouldn't want to repeat it!
- The fate of the heroine was meant to serve as a salutary lesson to young readers.
