 - They regrouped their forces and renewed the attack.
 - After its election defeat, the party needs to regroup.
 - The cavalry regrouped and attacked again.
- 2. intransitive (of a person)** to return to a normal state after an unpleasant experience or a period of difficulty, and become ready to make an effort again with new enthusiasm or strength
 - Summer is a time to relax, regroup and catch up on all those things you've been putting off all year.
