- tell to talk about something to someone, so that they know about it: Don't tell anyone about this just yet. | Shall I tell you a secret?
- disclose formal to publicly reveal something such as a fact or a name that has been kept secret: The terms of the agreement have not yet been disclosed. | The agent did not disclose that there had been a violent crime in the house.
- divulge //daɪ'vʌldʒ, də-// formal to reveal important or personal information which was previously secret or unknown: The bank has refused to divulge its plans. I I'm afraid I cannot divulge what was said to me.
- make something public to tell people about important information, especially after it has been kept secret: Apparently they were engaged for some time before making it public. | The government has agreed that sources of financing should in future be made public.
- leak to deliberately give secret information to a newspaper, television company etc, when a government or other organization wants to keep it secret: The contents of the email were leaked to the press. | A man was charged today with leaking official
- give something away (also spill the beans informal) to tell someone something that you want to keep secret: He was careful not to give away any trade secrets. I I'm not going to give away how much I paid for it!
