Word Origin:late Middle English: from Latin, from *stupere* 'be amazed or stunned'.Example Bank:

- As the whisky took effect, he gradually fell into a drunken stupor.
- He fell into an alcoholic stupor.
- He fell to the ground in a stupor.
- The noise of someone banging at the door roused her from her stupor.
- They left him slumped in a drunken stupor.
