2. *книжн.* отсюда, поэтому

hopeless and thence helpless - безнадёжный и поэтому беспомощный

it follows thence - из этого вытекает, отсюда следует

you didn't work, thence you will get no pay - вы не работали, стало быть, ничего не получите

3. *редк.* с того времени

a year thence - спустя год с того времени /после этого/
