1) горе, страдание

in great tribulation - в большом горе

war is a time of tribulation - война - время (тяжёлых) испытаний

whatever tribulations they might give you - сколько бы горя /огорчений/ они вам ни причинили

2) несчастье, беда; невзгоды

tribulations of everyday life - тяготы повседневной жизни, тяготы быта

to bear one's tribulations bravely - мужественно переносить несчастья

he is beset by tribulations of all kinds - с ним всегда случаются всякие несчастья

Word Origin:

Middle English: via Old French from ecclesiastical Latin **tribulatio(n-)**, from Latin **tribulare** ‘press, oppress’, from **tribulum** ‘threshing board (constructed of sharp points)’, based on **terere** ‘rub’.
