Derived Word [↑idiosyncratic](#)**Word Origin:**early 17th cent. (originally in the sense 'physical constitution peculiar to an individual'): from Greek **idiōsunkrasia**, from **idiōs** 'own, private' + **sun** 'with' + **krasis** 'mixture'.**Example Bank:**

- The microphone is likely to exaggerate the idiosyncrasies of a voice.
- The pub was famous for the idiosyncrasies of its landlord.
- We are all individuals, unique beings with our own special qualities and idiosyncrasies.
