- The factory **fell into disuse** twenty years ago.

Word Origin:

late Middle English (in the sense 'being unaccustomed'): from **dis-** (expressing negation) + the noun **use**.

Example Bank:

- Her muscles had become weak through disuse.
- Much of the factory is in disuse.
- The workforce has shrunk to less than a thousand and much of the plant is in disuse.
