Word Origin:

late Middle English (as a noun in the sense 'request, demand'): from Old French, or from Latin *requisitio(n)-*, from *requirere* 'search for', from *re-* (expressing intensive force) + *quaerere* 'seek'. The verb dates from the mid 19th cent.

verb ~ sth

to officially demand the use of a building, vehicle, etc, especially during a war or an emergency

- The school was requisitioned as a military hospital.
- The government could not afford to pay for all the grain that it had requisitioned from farmers.
