Word Origin:  
late Middle English (in the sense 'roar, bellow'): from Middle Dutch **blaren**, **bleren**, or Low German **blaren**, of imitative origin. Current senses date from the late 18th cent.

Example Bank:

- Music blared from the open window.
- Police cars sped past with their lights flashing and sirens blaring.
- The radio was blaring out rock music.

*noun singular*  
a loud unpleasant noise

- the blare of car horns
- the constant blare of music from the house next door

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Example Bank:

- There was a constant blare of music from the house next door.
