- [frʊθ] n**
 - пена
beer covered with froth - пенящееся пиво
froth flotation - *mex.* пенная флотация
 - вздор; пустословие; болтовня
this talk is all froth - это всё пустая болтовня

- [frʊθ] v**
 - 1) пениться, кипеть; покрываться пеной
a mad dog froths at the mouth - у бешеной собаки пена идёт изо рта
the sea frothed on the rocks - море пенилось у скал
 - 2) взмывливаться, покрываться пеной (о лошади)
 2. вспенивать; сбивать в пену
to froth eggs - сбивать яичный белок
to froth up the soap mixture - взбить мыльную пену
 3. пустословить, трепаться

- uncountable** a mass of small bubbles, especially on the surface of a liquid
Syn: †foam
• a glass of beer with thick froth on top
• The horse's bit was covered with white froth.
- uncountable** ideas, activities, etc. that seem attractive and enjoyable but have no real value
- singular ~ of sth** something that looks like a mass of small bubbles on liquid
• a froth of black lace

Word Origin:

late Middle English: from Old Norse *frotha*, *frauth*.

Example Bank:

- The barman around here always top up your beer with too much froth.

verb

- intransitive, transitive ~ (sth)** if a liquid froths, or if sb/sth froths it, a mass of small bubbles appears on the surface
• a cup of frothing coffee
• The water gushed and frothed.
- intransitive** to produce a lot of †saliva (= liquid in your mouth)
• The dog was **frothing at the mouth** .
• (figurative) He **frothed at the mouth** (= was very angry) when I asked for more money.

late Middle English: from Old Norse *frotha*, *frauth*.

- The waiter brought us two cups of frothing coffee.

1. [singular, uncountable] a mass of small ↑bubbles on the top of a liquid **SYN foam**:
 'Excellent beer,' he said, wiping the froth from his mouth.
2. [singular, uncountable] small white ↑bubbles of ↑saliva around a person's or animal's mouth
3. [uncountable] talk or ideas that are attractive but have no real value or meaning:
 The book has too much froth and not enough fact.

II. froth² BrE^u AmE^u *verb* [intransitive]

1. (also **froth up**) if a liquid froths, it produces or contains a lot of small ↑bubbles on top:
 When you first open the bottle the beer will froth for a few seconds.
2. if someone's mouth froths, ↑saliva comes out as small white ↑bubbles
3. **froth at the mouth**
 - a) to have ↑saliva coming out of your mouth as small white ↑bubbles
 - b) *informal* to be extremely angry
