- a civil case (=not a criminal case) He is involved with civil cases, not criminal ones.
- a test case (-one that will establish a principle for the first time) If the dispute goes to court it could be an important test case
- a landmark case (=one that established a principle for the first time) a landmark case about copyright protection for computer software
- a high-profile case (=one that gets a lot of attention) a defense lawyer who has handled some high-profile cases

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- bring a case (against somebody) There was not enough evidence to bring a case against him.
- hear/try a case (=listen to the evidence before making a judgment) The case will be heard by a federal judge.
- win/lose a case (=be successful or unsuccessful in proving someone guilty or not guilty) Lomax was a brilliant lawyer who had neverlost a case.
- settle a case (=end it finally) He paid a \$15,000 fine to settle the case.
- adjourn a case (=stop it for a short time) The case was adjourned until next month for further reports.
- dismiss/throw out a case (=officially stop it from continuing) The case was thrown out by New York state's highest court.
- drop a case (=not continue with it) The case was dropped because of a lack of evidence.
- a case comes/goes to court When the case finally came to court, they were found not guilty.
- a case comes/goes to trial By the time her case went to trial, her story had changed.
- **a case comes before a judge/court** The case came before the federal courts.
