**Assessor evaluate ?** You **assess** sb/sth in order to make a judgement to see if it is satisfactory. You **evaluate** sb/sth to understand it better so that more informed decisions can be made.

- It is difficult to assess the building's value properly without seeing it.
- It is difficult to assess the quality of artistic work.
- She carefully assessed the situation.
- She decided to get her daughter assessed for dyslexia.
- The company has put great effort into assessing the needs of its customers.
- The legal costs have been assessed at \$75 000.
- The studies were independently assessed by several researchers.
- to assess the potential of alternative energy sources
- A mountain guide is trained and assessed on five gruelling courses.
- I'd assess your chances of winning as pretty low.
- It is very difficult to assess accurately the costs of corporate crime.
