Rapid, swift and speedy are more formal words.

Rapid is most commonly used to describe the speed at which something changes. It is not used to describe the speed at which something moves or is done: a rapid train  $\diamondsuit$ We had a rapid coffee.

Swift usually describes something that happens or is done quickly and immediately: ■ a swift decision ♦ The government took swift action.

Speedy has a similar meaning: • a speedy recovery. It is used less often to talk about the speed at which something moves: a speedy car.

For the use of fast and quick as adverbs, see the usage note at \daggerapprox quick.
