1. that cannot live for ever and must die

• We are all mortal.

- 2. (literary) causing death or likely to cause death; very serious
- · a mortal blow/wound
- · to be in mortal danger
- (figurative) Her reputation suffered a mortal blow as a result of the scandal.

compare ↑fatal

3. only before noun (formal) lasting until death

Syn: †deadly

- · mortal enemies
- They were locked in mortal combat (= a fight that will only end with the death of one of them).
- 4. only before noun (formal) (of fear, etc.) extreme
  - · We lived in mortal dread of him discovering our secret.

Word Origin:

late Middle English: from Old French, or from Latin mortalis, from mors, mort- 'death'.

noun (often humorous)

a human, especially an ordinary person with little power or influence

Syn: †human being

- · old stories about gods and mortals
- (humorous) Such things are not for mere mortals like ourselves.
- (humorous) She can deal with complicated numbers in her head, but we lesser mortals need calculators!

Word Origin:

late Middle English: from Old French, or from Latin mortalis, from mors, mort- 'death'.

1. not able to live for ever OPP immortal:

Her father's death reminded her that she was mortal.

# 2. mortal blow/danger/wound etc

a) something very serious that may cause the end of something:

The computer has dealt a mortal blow to traditional printing methods.

Our health service is in mortal danger.

### b) something that causes death or may cause death ⇒ lethal:

Near the end of the battle, he received a mortal wound.

the screams of men in mortal combat (=fighting until one person kills the other)

### 3. mortal enemy/foe an enemy that you hate very much and will always hate:

He glared at Claudia as if she were his mortal enemy.

#### 4. mortal fear/dread/terror extreme fear:

She lives in mortal fear of her husband's anger.

### 5. sb's mortal remains formal someone's body, after they have died:

the churchyard where his mortal remains lie (=where his body is buried)

## **6**. *literary* human – used especially when comparing humans with gods, ↑spirits etc:

Both gods and mortal men found her captivating.

## 7. mortal coil literary life or the state of being alive:

when Hubbard shuffled off this mortal coil (=died)
