- a powerful position Many leaders from that period are still in powerful positions in government.
- **a dominant position** The firm achieved a dominant position in the world market.

- maintain a position (=keep the rank that you have) High-status groups do all they can to maintain their positions.
- use your position She can now use her position to do some good.
