Word Origin:mid 16th cent. (denoting an investigation): from French, or from Latin *exploratio(n-)*, from the verb *explorare* 'search out', from *ex-* 'out' + *plorare* 'utter a cry'. The current sense dates from the early 19th cent.Example Bank:
