Word Origin:

late Middle English: from Old French *disposer*, from Latin *disponere* 'arrange', influenced by *dispositus* 'arranged' and Old French *poser* 'to place'.

formal to arrange things or put them in their places:
" Chinese vases are disposed around the gallery.

dispose of something *phrasal verb*

1. to get rid of something, especially something that is difficult to get rid of:
" an incinerator built to dispose of toxic waste

2. to sell something, especially part of a business:

" I am still not sure how best to dispose of the shares.

3. *formal* to deal with something such as a problem or question successfully:

" Your idea at least disposes of the immediate problem.

4. to defeat an opponent:

" Two goals by Raúl disposed of Barcelona.

dispose somebody to/towards something *phrasal verb formal*

to make someone more likely to have particular feelings or thoughts:

" The body releases a chemical that disposes you towards sleep.
