In BrE staff (sense 1) can be singular: • a staff of ten (= a group of ten people) or plural: • I have ten staff working for me . If it is the subject of a verb, this verb is plural: • The staff in this shop are very helpful.

In NAME staff (senses 1 and 2) can only be singular: • a staff of ten (but not ten staff). • The staff in this store is very helpful. The plural form staffs is less frequent but is used in both BrE and NAME to refer to more than one group of people: • the senator and his staff (singular) • senators and their staffs (plural).
