    ▶ Do not use a preposition ('at', 'in', 'on' etc) before a phrase with ago:

    They first met fifteen years ago (NOT at/in fifteen years ago).

    Do not use 'since' or 'before' with ago:

    I came to the US two months ago (NOT since/before two months ago).
