- 1) *мед.* капиллярная трубочка с радиом (употребляется при лечении рака)
- 2) *мед.* вживлённая, имплантированная пересаженная ткань, кожа *и т. п.*, имплантат

2. [ɪmˈplɑːnt] *v (in) часто pass*

- 1. насаждать, вселять, внушать, внедрять (*идеи, мысли, взгляды и т. п.*)  
to implant aspirations in smb.'s mind - вдохновить кого-л.  
to implant one's convictions [views] in smb.'s mind - внушать свои убеждения [взгляды] кому-л.  
to implant doubt in smb.'s mind - посеять сомнения в ком-л.  
to implant good taste - привить хороший вкус

- 1. **transitive ~ sth (in/into sth)** to fix an idea, attitude, etc. firmly in sb's mind  
• Prejudices can easily become implanted in the mind.
- 2. **transitive ~ sth (in/into sth)** to put sth (usually sth artificial) into a part of the body for medical purposes, usually by means of an operation  
• an electrode implanted into the brain  
• So far, only one person has survived an operation to implant an artificial heart.
- compare** ↑transplant
- 3. **intransitive ~ (in/into sth)** (*of an egg or an embryo*) to become fixed inside the body of a person or an animal so that it can start to develop  
• The embryo is placed into the uterus where it has a chance to implant.

- 1. **[transitive]** to strongly fix an idea, feeling, attitude etc in someone's mind or character  
**implant something in something**  
A deep sense of patriotism had been implanted in him by his father.
- 2. **[transitive]** to put something into someone's body by performing a medical operation:  
Surgeons successfully implanted an artificial hip.  
**implant something in/into something**  
A donor egg fertilised by her husband's sperm will be implanted in her womb.
- 3. **[intransitive] medical** if an egg or **embryo** implants, it begins to develop normally:  
The fertilized egg implants and becomes a foetus.
