a reaction of anger or strong protest shown by people in public

- an outcry over the proposed change
- The new tax provoked a **public outcry** .
- There was outcry at the judge's statement.

Example Bank:

- The bombing caused an international outcry.
- There was a massive public outcry against the harsh prison sentence.
- an immediate outcry from workers over pay reductions
- Just imagine the outcry if he pulled out of the tournament now.
- No one was surprised by the immediate outcry from workers over the pay reductions.
- The new funding plans have caused outcry among dentists.
- There was outcry at the judge's statement.
