 - слушание, выслушивание
 - слух, чувство слуха
 - театр.*, *кино* проба, прослушивание (*исполнителей*); проба актёров на исполнение ролей (*в кинофильме*)
first audition - первое прослушивание, первый тур (*конкурса и т. п.*)
 - психол.*, *пед.* аудирование

 - устраивать пробу, прослушивать (*вокалистов, актёров и т. п.*)
 - проходить пробу (*об исполнителях*)

a short performance given by an actor, a singer, etc, so that sb can decide whether they are suitable to act in a play, sing in a concert, etc

- Auditions will be held from 9–12 on Friday.
- She had an audition for drama school.

Word Origin:

late 16th cent. (in the sense 'power of hearing or listening'): from Latin *auditiō(n-)*, from *audire* 'hear'. The current sense of the noun dates from the late 19th cent.

Example Bank:

- We're holding auditions for new actors.
- an audition for a place at drama school
- an audition with Houston Ballet
- an audition with the Royal Ballet
- I had a letter four days later to say I had passed the audition.
- She had an audition for a small part in a soap opera.
- You need to choose your audition piece carefully.

verb

- intransitive** ~ (for sth) to take part in an [↑]audition
 - She was auditioning for the role of Lady Macbeth.
 - Hundreds of people auditioned.
- transitive** ~ sb (for sth) to watch, listen to and judge sb at an [↑]audition
 - We auditioned over 200 children for the part.
