- 1. сбор (для проверки, осмотра); смотр; осмотр, освидетельствование; переключка, поверка  
to make /to take/ muster **воен.** сделать /провести/ смотр  
to pass muster - а) **воен.** пройти осмотр /проверку/; б) выдержать испытание /экзамен/; оказаться годным /приемлемым/;  
быть удовлетворительным  
work that will pass muster - работа, которая будет принята /пройдёт/
- 2. 1) собрание, сбор; скопление; коллекция
- 2) общее число (людей или вещей); все присутствующие; всё собранное  
in full muster - в полном составе
- 3. = muster roll

- 1. 1) собирать (часто muster up)  
to muster the soldiers - собрать солдат на переключку **и т. п.**  
all the food I could muster - вся еда, которую я смог раздобыть  
to muster a unit - **воен.** формировать часть  
to muster (up) all one's courage - собрать всё своё мужество  
to muster one's thoughts - собраться с мыслями  
to muster all one's strength - собраться с силами, мобилизовать все свои силы
- 2) **мор.** делать переключку
- 3) собираться (**тж.** muster up)  
to muster for roll-call - собраться на переключку
- 2. насчитывать  
a society that musters a hundred members - общество, насчитывающее сто членов  
we mustered ten - нас набралось десять (человек)

to muster into (the) service - зачислять на военную службу  
to muster out of service - увольнять с военной службы, демобилизовывать

- 1. **transitive ~ sth (up)** to find as much support, courage, etc. as you can  
**Syn:** ↑summon  
• We mustered what support we could for the plan.  
• She left the room **with all the** dignity **she could muster** .  
• He could muster only 154 votes at the election.
- 2. **intransitive, transitive** to come together, or bring people, especially soldiers, together for example for military action  
**Syn:** ↑gather  
• The troops mustered.  
• The force mustered 1 000 strong.  
• ~ **sb/sth** to muster an army  
• The navy could muster 44 warships.
- 3. **transitive ~ sth (AustralE, NZE)** to gather together sheep or cows

### I. **muster**<sup>1</sup> /'mʌstə \$ -ər/ *BrE* <sup>u</sup> *AmE* <sup>u</sup> *verb*

[Date: 1300-1400; Language: Old French; Origin: monstret, from Latin monstrare 'to show']

1. **[transitive]** (also **muster up something**) to get enough courage, confidence, support etc to do something, especially with difficulty

#### **SYN** summon (up)

**muster (up) the courage/confidence/energy etc to do something**

- Finally I mustered up the courage to ask her out.
- Senator Newbolt has been trying to muster support for his proposals.
- 'It's going to be fine,' replied David, with as much confidence as he could muster.

2. **[intransitive and transitive]** if soldiers muster, or if someone musters them, they come together in a group **SYN** gather:

▪ In April 1185, he began to muster an army.

1. **pass muster (as something)** to be accepted as good enough for something:

▪ I wasn't sure that our clothing would pass muster at the club door.

2. **[countable] literary** a gathering together of soldiers so that they can be counted, checked etc
