dark red in colour
 - She went crimson (= her face became very red because she was embarrassed) .

Word Origin:

late Middle English: from obsolete French *cramoisin* or Old Spanish *cremesin*, based on Arabic *qirmizī*, from *qirmiz*. Compare with ↑*carmine*.

Example Bank:

- He turned bright crimson.
- She was crimson with rage.
- a beautiful deep crimson colour
