- His idea of a brilliant conversational gambit is 'What's a nice girl like you doing in a place like this?'
- 2. a move or moves made at the beginning of a game of tchess in order to gain an advantage later

Word Origin:

mid 17th cent.: originally gambett, from Italian gambetto, literally 'tripping up', from gamba 'leg'.

Example Bank:

- It looks as if their gambit has paid off.
- It was a clever publicity gambit that ended in tragedy.
- The long silences were a gambit to make him talk.
