Word Origin:

mid 16th cent. (originally denoting a clerk or registrar of a court): from Latin **actuarius** 'bookkeeper', from **actus** 'event, thing done', **act-** 'done', from the verb **agere**, reinforced by the French noun **acte**. The current sense dates from the mid 19th cent.
