 2. прогонять, выгонять, выдворять
 to banish from the house - выгнать из дому
 to banish from one's presence - прогнать с глаз долой, приказать удалиться
3. отгонять (*мысли и т. п.*); избавляться
 to banish fear - избавиться от страха
 to banish shyness - преодолеть застенчивость

Word Origin:

late Middle English: from Old French **baniss-**, lengthened stem of **banir**; ultimately of Germanic origin and related to ↑**ban**.
