Word Origin:

Old English **mus(c)le**, superseded by forms from Middle Low German **mussel**, Middle Dutch **mosscele**; ultimately from late Latin **muscula**, from Latin **musculus**, diminutive of **mus** ‘mouse’ (some muscles being thought to be mouse-like in form).
