### shoot off phrasal verb British English informal

to leave somewhere quickly or suddenly:

Sorry, but I'll have to shoot off before the end of the meeting.

## shoot through phrasal verb

Australian English informal to leave a place quickly, especially in order to avoid someone or something ⇒ be shot through with something at ↑shot²(3)

### shoot up phrasal verb

- 1. to increase very quickly and suddenly SYN rocket:
  - Demand for water has shot up by 70% over the last 30 years.
- 2. if a child shoots up, he or she grows taller very quickly and suddenly:
  - I can't believe this is Joshua he's shot up since we last saw him!
- 3.  $shoot somebody/something \leftrightarrow up$  to cause serious injury or damage to someone or something by shooting them with bullets:
  - Then two men came in and shot up the entire lobby.
- 4. shoot up (something) informal to put illegal drugs into your blood, using a needle SYN inject:
  - Kids as young as ten are shooting up heroin.
