Word Origin:Middle English: from Old French, or from Latin *restitutio*(n-), from *restituere* 'restore', from *re-* 'again' + *statuere* 'establish'.Example Bank:

- The company has a legal duty to make restitution to passengers for any inconvenience caused.
- The family's lawyer is demanding the restitution of all family property seized under the previous regime.
