example • something such as an object, a fact or a situation that shows, explains or supports what you say; a thing that is typical of or represents a particular group or set: • Can you give me an example of what you mean?

case • a particular situation or a situation of a particular type; a situation that relates to a particular person or thing: • In some cases people have had to wait several weeks for an appointment.

instance • (rather formal) a particular situation or a situation of a particular type: • The report highlights a number of instances of injustice.

specimen • an example of sth, especially an animal or plant: • The aquarium has some interesting specimens of unusual tropical fish.

what you say when giving examples

• for example used when giving an example: Prices have risen sharply. The price of gasoline, for example, has risen by over 50%. | Nepal has many attractions for visitors. For example, you can go trekking in the Himalayas, or see tigers in Chitwan National Park.

• for instance used when giving an example. For instance is slightly less formal than for example and is used more in spoken English: There were many unanswered questions. For instance, where was the money going to come from? | Some people are really good languages. <u>Take Katie</u>, for instance.

• eg/e.g. *written* used when giving an example or a list of examples. Don't use eg in formal writing – use the full phrase for example : Make sure you eat foods that contain protein, e.g. meat, fish, eggs, milk, or cheese.

• such as *especially written* used when giving one or two typical examples when there are many others: It is difficult to get even basic foods such as bread and sugar.

• take spoken used when giving a particular example as a way of proving that what you are saying is correct: Take John – he has

a good job but he didn't go to university. I It is possible to recover from some types of cancer. <u>Take</u> skin cancer, for example.

• be a case in point used when emphasizing that someone or something is a good or typical example of what you have just mentioned: Some birds have returned to Britain after once being extinct here. The return of the osprey is a case in point.
