- 1. (*grammar*) a group of words that includes a subject and a verb, and forms a sentence or part of a sentence
 - In the sentence 'They often go to Italy because they love the food', 'They often go to Italy' is the main clause and 'because they love the food' is a subordinate clause.
- 2. an item in a legal document that says that a particular thing must or must not be done
 - There is a clause in the contract forbidding tenants to sublet.

Word Origin:

Middle English: via Old French **clause**, based on Latin **claus-** 'shut, closed', from the verb **claudere**.

Example Bank:

- The contract contains a confidentiality clause.
- The penalty clause specifies that late delivery will be fined.
- There is some ambiguity in this clause.
- Under Clause 5.8, the company is responsible for the health of its employees.
- We added an opt-out clause to the agreement.
- a clause on pollution
- a restrictive relative clause
- Clause 2.7.3 should be studied carefully.
- Many of the clauses will have to be amended.
