Convince or persuade? You can persuade sb to do sth in many ways, for example by making them believe it is right, or by showing them that they will gain sth from it

He was persuaded by bribes to reverse his judgement.

When you convince sb to do sth you usually make them believe that it is the right or the best thing to do

He convinced me to get legal advice.

This meaning of **convince** is used more in American English than British; many speakers of British English prefer always to use **persuade** in this meaning.

#### persuade / convince

The main meaning of persuade is to make someone agree to do something by giving them good reasons for doing it: • I tried to persuade her to see a doctor. The main meaning of convince is to make someone believe that something is true: • He convinced me he was right.

It is quite common, however, for each of these words to be used with both meanings, especially for convince to be used as a synonym for persuade: • I persuaded/convinced her to see a doctor. Some speakers of *BrE* think that this is not correct.

- **convince** to persuade someone that they should do something, because it is the best or the right thing to do. Some British speakers think this use is incorrect, and prefer to use **persuade**: It would be difficult to convince him to move.

- influence to have an effect on what someone decides to do: What influences you to buy clothes?
