**noun**

1. a television screen used to show particular kinds of information; a screen that shows information from a computer
  - The details of today's flights are displayed on the monitor.
  - a PC with a 17-inch colour monitor

2. a piece of equipment used to check or record sth
  - a heart monitor
3. a student in a school who performs special duties, such as helping the teacher
4. a person whose job is to check that sth is done fairly and honestly, especially in a foreign country
  - UN monitors declared the referendum fair.
5. a large tropical ↑lizard (= a type of ↑reptile)

Word Origin:

early 16th cent. (in sense 3): from Latin, from **monit-** 'warned', from the verb **monere**. Sense 2 dates from the 1930s.

Example Bank:

- He was lying there hooked up to a heart monitor.
- The heart monitor shows the strength of your pulse.
- The security staff can see all the outside of the building on their CCTV monitors.

1. ~ **sth** | ~ **what, how, etc...** to watch and check sth over a period of time in order to see how it develops, so that you can make any necessary changes

**Syn:** ↑track

• Each student's progress is closely monitored.

2. ~ **sth** to listen to telephone calls, foreign radio broadcasts, etc. in order to find out information that might be useful

**Monitor or track?** You **monitor** sth because the information is necessary and you may need to take action; you **track** sth because what you find out might be interesting.

### Example Bank:

- Television advertising is strictly monitored.
- The authorities will continue to monitor the situation.
- The workers are constantly monitored for exposure to radiation.
- We will now be able to monitor its progress more closely.
- During the war his job was to monitor enemy radio broadcasts.
- Each student's progress is closely monitored over the term.
- Foreign observers monitored voting at polling stations around the country.
- The animals' temperature and heartbeat are regularly monitored.
- The company routinely monitors all its employees' emails.
- Uniformed and undercover police officers monitored the demonstration closely.
- We need to monitor how the situation develops.
- We were warned by a friend in the government that our phone calls were being monitored.

1. **SCREEN** a television or part of a computer with a screen, on which you can see pictures or information

**on a monitor**

- We could watch what was happening on the TV monitor.

2. **PIECE OF EQUIPMENT FOR MEASURING** a piece of equipment that measures and shows the level, speed, temperature etc of something:

- a heart monitor
- The noise monitor recorded 98 decibels.

3. **SOMEBODY WHO WATCHES AN ACTIVITY** someone whose job is to watch an activity or a situation to see how it changes or develops, or to make sure that it is fair and legal:

- UN monitors will remain in the country to supervise the elections.

**peace/human rights etc monitors**

The UN is sending peace monitors to the area.

4. **CHILD** a child who has been chosen to help a teacher in some way in class

5. **SOMEBODY WHO LISTENS TO RADIO** someone whose job is to listen to news or messages on a radio and report on them
