Word Origin:mid 16th cent. (denoting a continuous tract of land): from Latin **terra continens** ‘continuous land’.Example Bank:

- He crossed a whole continent to find his family.
- He journeyed across continents in his quest for adventure
- The evidence that the continents have drifted is overwhelming
- The police investigation spanned three continents.
- Wolves are still found on the continent of Europe.
- the first railway to cross the North American continent
