a substance, for example ↑penicillin, that can destroy or prevent the growth of bacteria and cure infections

Word Origin:mid 19th cent. (in the sense 'doubting the possibility of life in a certain environment'): from ↑anti- + Greek *biōtikos* 'fit for life' (from *bios* 'life').Example Bank:

- I got an antibiotic for my ear infection.
- Meat from animals that receive antibiotics could not be classified as organic.
- The doctor prescribed antibiotics.
- The doctor put her on a course of antibiotics.
