1. a set of physical conditions that show you have a particular disease or medical problem
 - PMS or premenstrual syndrome
 - This syndrome is associated with frequent coughing.
- see also** ↑AIDS, ↑Down's syndrome, ↑economy class syndrome, ↑sick building syndrome, ↑Tourette's syndrome
2. a set of opinions or a way of behaving that is typical of a particular type of person, attitude or social problem
 - With teenagers, be prepared for the 'Me, me, me!' syndrome (= they think of themselves first) .

Word Origin:mid 16th cent.: modern Latin, from Greek *sundromē*, from *sun-* 'together' + *dramein* 'to run'.Example Bank:

- This phenomenon has become known as the 'Californian syndrome'.
- This syndrome mostly affects women in their forties.
