- 1. **intransitive** to work together with sb in order to produce or achieve sth
 - Researchers around the world are collaborating to develop a new vaccine.
 - ~ **(with sb) (on sth)** We have collaborated on many projects over the years.
 - ~ **(with sb) (in sth/in doing sth)** She agreed to collaborate with him in writing her biography.
- 2. **intransitive** ~ **(with sb) (disapproving)** to help the enemy who has taken control of your country during a war
 - He was accused of collaborating with the enemy.

 - collaborate to do something**
 - Researchers are collaborating to develop the vaccine.
 - collaborate in (doing) something**
 - Elephants collaborate in looking after their young.
- REGISTER**
 - In everyday English, people usually say they **work together on** something rather than **collaborate on** something:
 - They are working together on some new songs.
- 2. to help a country that your country is fighting a war with, especially one that has taken control of your country ⇒ **collaborator**
 - collaborate with**
 - Vigilantes began combing the city for anyone known to have collaborated with the enemy.
