Resentment or bitterness? Bitterness can be sudden and can last a long or short time

- She felt touched with a momentary/sudden bitterness.
- The long occupation of the island has left a legacy of bitterness.

Resentment may be a less obvious feeling: people try or fail to hide it. It grows more slowly, but it may be shared by many people • his growing/increasing/mounting/smouldering resentment

• **spleen** *formal* anger, especially anger that is unreasonable: He <u>vented</u> his <u>spleen</u> (*=said* why he was angry)against the airline in an article in the Times.
