Syn: ↑used to

- ~ **to sth** to **become/get accustomed** to sth
- My eyes slowly **grew accustomed** to the dark.
- This was not the kind of behaviour I was accustomed to.
- ~ **to doing sth** She was a person accustomed to having eight hours' sleep a night.

2. usually before noun (formal) usual

Syn: ↑habitual

- He took his accustomed seat by the fire.

Opp: ↑unaccustomed

Example Bank:

- She had grown accustomed to his long absences.

1. **be accustomed to (doing) something** to be familiar with something and accept it as normal:

- We were accustomed to working together.

become/grow/get accustomed to something

- Her eyes quickly became accustomed to the dark.

REGISTER

In everyday English, people usually say **be used to** instead of **be accustomed to**, and **get used to** instead of **get/become accustomed to**:

- She's used to working with children.
- It's hard at first, but you'll get used to it.

2. [only before noun] **formal** usual:

- The pans were in their accustomed places.
