In everyday English, people usually use **lazy**: The beggars were too idle to look for work. | Her son was bone idle (=extremely lazy).• **indolent** *formal* lazy and living a comfortable life: He spent an indolent first year at Oxford. | the indolent son of a wealthy landowner• **shiftless** lazy and having no ambition to succeed or do anything useful with your life: her shiftless husband

- **work-shy** *British English* lazy and trying to avoid any work: He was work-shy, and no one could remember when he'd last held a job.
- **slothful** *formal* lazy and not liking physical activity: Her advice to slothful Americans is: 'Get out there and walk!'
