1. проветривать, вентилировать (*помещение, шахту*); создавать обмен воздуха
2. снабжать клапаном, отдушиной
3. 1) **обсуждать, вентилировать** (*вопрос*)
to ventilate certain subjects - обсудить некоторые вопросы, поговорить на кое-какие темы
to ventilate certain points - выяснить /уточнить при обсуждении/ некоторые пункты *или* моменты
- 2) **высказывать** (*особ. публично*); предавать гласности
to ventilate a grievance - выступить с жалобой
the matter should not be hushed up but freely ventilated - это дело надо не замалчивать, а предать гласности /сделать достоянием общественности/
4. *арх.* **веять** (*зерно*)
5. *физиол.* насыщать кровь кислородом
the lungs ventilate the blood - лёгкие насыщают кровь кислородом

Word Origin:

late Middle English (in the sense 'winnow, scatter'): from Latin **ventilat-** 'blown, winnowed', from the verb **ventilare**, from **ventus** 'wind'. Sense 1 dates from the mid 18th cent.
