- Rub the margarine into the flour.
- She put some margarine on her roll.
- Spread some margarine on the toast, please.
- a tub of low-fat margarine
- My dietician recommends a slice of wholemeal bread with a little polyunsaturated margarine for breakfast.
- She took some margarine and spread it on the bread.
- There's a new tub of margarine in the fridge.
