(in Judaism and Christianity) the holy day of the week that is used for resting and worshipping God. For Jews this day is Saturday and for Christians it is Sunday

• to **keep/break the Sabbath** (= to obey/not obey the religious rules for this day)

Word Origin:

Old English, from Latin sabbatum, via Greek from Hebrew šabbāt, from šāb at 'to rest'.

Example Bank:

- It was considered a sin to work or play on the Sabbath.
- The speaker advocated a less austere observance of the Sabbath.
